What Ever Happened To...

I recently attended a seminar which once again emphasized the importance of communication for a group such as MPI. Several seminar attendees discussed the past presidents of our chapter, and they wondered what happened to these deeply committed, involved past leaders. I never realized that it appeared to the membership that the involvement of past presidents ended with their term in office. Here's what happens after you are a "pres."

Every one of the D/FW Chapter's 14 past presidents is still involved and committed to the goals of our chapter. We are all part of the Past Presidents Council, which meets monthly and answers directly to the current President of the chapter. The council is charged with several duties.

First and foremost, we created and implemented the "Strategic Plan" for the D/FW Chapter, which will be updated on a regular basis. The "Strategic Plan" contains a mission statement—a blueprint, if you will, of the long-range goals for each area of the chapter. Each president since May 1990 (when the plan was finalized) has aligned their yearly goals to ensure that these long-range goals for the chapter would be met. Creation of the plan was a monumental task, and it has been invaluable to the success of our chapter, providing continuity to an organization whose leadership changes on a yearly basis.

The council is utilized as a sounding board for the chapter's Board of

Directors and chapter membership as a whole. Innovations tried in years past are improved upon. There is no need to "re-invent the wheel," so to speak.

The Past Presidents Council will play an active role in MPI's 1995 Professional Educational Conference (the PEC), which will take place here in Dallas. We have been critiquing each past PEC, ensuring that the 1995 PEC is the best conference MPI has ever conducted. International, handles security. From canines sniffing out drugs to SWAT team demonstrations, you will be able to see and learn all of the safety measures taken at airports—more than even a frequent traveler might imagine.

This up-close inspection of D/FW will also include an airport tour with visits to customs control, runway areas and just what it takes to operate—safely—an airport which encompasses more space than some small towns and has 49 million visitors every year.

So plan to come early and take advantage of the tour beginning at 4:30 p.m.; or wait until the work day is over and make it in time for a reception at the Public Affairs Building. Also in store for our members is a presentation by Len Limmer, Director of Public Safety for the airport. Mr. Limmer is also Chairman of the World Aviation Security Committee, based in Geneva, Switzerland. His knowledge of airport security and safety will surely be of interest to many.

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February Host Facility

D/FW Office of Public Affairs

Unlike other properties where MPI meets throughout the year, the Dallas/Fort Worth Airport is not specifically designed to hold functions or meetings. However, they do see millions of visitors through their area on a yearly basis.

This airport was dedicated on September 22, 1973, and began operations on January 13, 1974. It has become the world's second busiest airport (based on total passengers). The total real estate of D/FW consists of 18,177 acres, located in Dallas and Tarrant Counties. Approximately 34,000 airline and support employees, including 1,387 Airport Board employees, make up the base of this large work force.

Original investment at D/FW including facilities and land was based at \$1.6 billion. With the new Airport Development Plan, D/FW will invest \$3.5 billion for major airfield expansion and associated facilities. Terminals include 118 aircraft boarding gates within four terminals. There are also 55 food and beverage units, three coffee shops, 30 lounges, 65 snack bars and seven cafeterias.

Rated the single most important economic asset in the North Texas region, D/FW Airport has been a significant factor in the relocation and expansion of more than 260 businesses to Dallas/Fort Worth. Not surprisingly, it also generates more than \$6 billion annually to the Metroplex economy.

D/FW Airport—it may not be where your meeting starts. But you'll more than likely see it on your way. So join us on February 20!

Executive Workshop Wrap-Up

Twenty MPI members were on hand January 14 at the Crescent Court Hotel for the Executive Workshop entitled "Cruises: What You Should Know." Session facilitator was Patricia Tripp. Sally Zappella-Smith, National Sales Manager for Princess Cruises, was the guest speaker.

"Cruises are new to the meetings and incentives industry," Smith said. "We're all still getting used to them."

For the next 90 minutes, she introduced members to the cruise industry: choosing the right cruise and cruise line for your group, pricing considerations, negotiable items and program enhancements. "It's onestop shopping," Smith said.

Smith encouraged planners to be familiar with any cruise line and their ships before signing the dotted line, and to realize the group size and meeting requirements may dictate your destination. But she also added, "Staffing is the only real limitation. We can't increase the size of our staff; there just isn't enough room on board."

If planning a cruise, Smith advises a generous time frame for planning. For incentive trips, plan a year ahead when possible. Fall is off-season, and may bring better prices. Markets which are more competitive, such as the Caribbean, also offer better opportunities for negotiating.

"Another good thing about cruise meetings: There's no charge for the meeting rooms," said Smith. "I guess we haven't caught on yet."

After an enjoyable Crescent Court luncheon, high-energy cruise film and lots of interesting information, members were ready to board the nearest ship. But don't look for your cabin to have a porthole. Smith says they've been replaced by the modern-day window.


