In addition to hosting the most exceptional PEC ever-a well-received European Council visit to the D/FW area—we accomplished tremendous educational goals, had great success in recruiting, member involvement and programming.

Patti Wilke, CMP, chaired the most successful Kids Charity Ball ever, which cleared more than \$70,000 for children's charities.

The Education Committee, chaired by VP Education Greg Pynes, produced 35 educational offerings averaging 30 people per program and attracting more planners than suppliers. Greg was named by The Meeting Manager as a "Rising Star."

Two successful Walk-a-While-in-My-Shoes Programs, chaired by Susie Carr, CMP, brought raves from participants. The CMP Programs, chaired by Pat McCain, CMP, continued its 100% success rate. The Technology Institute at Richland College chaired by Sherri Cook, CMP was well-received.

VP Programs Michelle Carter provided stimulating, relevant programs based on state-of-the-art topics that resulted in record high attendance.

Mark Lazarow, through his business, Custom Video Services, videotaped each meeting and made them available to mem-

Our award-winning newsletter, the CURRENT, under the expert editorship of Gracie Hilton, remains one of the best in the international organization.

VP Membership Sally Goldesberry, CMP, led her committee to reach an alltime high membership count of 669, with 182 new members! Sally chaired the Chapter Management Forum at the PEC and has been named chair of the International Chapter Relations Committee.

Membership involvement was increased, and a new volunteer recognition program, "Stars of the Month" resulted in a conference scholarship awarded to Karen

Dana Nickerson, CMP, VP Public Relations/Marketing and her newsmaking committee increased community awareness about MPI. The D/FW Chapter story was told by at least four radio stations (including a half-hour interview on KYNG about The Kids Charity Ball), five newspapers, PSAs on TV and The Meeting Manager. The committee developed the "Bill and Angie Barrett Award" for those who "love the kids."

Linda Sergeant, VP Administration, improved professionalism and effectiveness through a new chapter management staff with Joe Kolb of Don Dillon Associates. Her committee raised more revenue than ever before with ad sales for the Membership Directory. She updated our policies and procedures—an arduous task! Linda conducted MPINet training sessions for the Board of Directors and for many members of the Texas Hill Country Chapter.

VP Finance Charlotte Merrill-Davis, CMP, along with Jan Pollard of the Finance Committee, consolidated our bank accounts, which resulted in new benefits, including the complimentary use of credit card equipment and volunteer staffing for The Kids Charity Ball.

Jan Pollard initiated the "Stars Program" for supplier recognition, and the Table Host project to move announcements from the lectern to individual tables.

Immediate Past President Diane Smith. CMP, oversaw the creation of the PO⁴Ds education program and served as chair of the Nominating Committee. She represented our chapter on the Love For Kids Board of Directors and planned Fort Worth activities for the European Council.

President-Elect Mary Lynn Novelli, CMP, oversaw production of Texas Cookin'-a PEC amenity and MPI Foundation fundraiser. Funds—approximately \$8,000—raised from cookbook sales was used for educational scholarships through the Professional Growth Awards Committee and our contribution to The Foundation. She chaired the Mentor Committee which was co-chaired by Maurine Allen, CMP, and Fred Knieberg, CMP.

Traci Bower exceeded expectations by improving participation in the Job Bank by 66% and increasing revenue to \$2100, a 62% increase—allowing for even more educational scholarships.

Gail Lemaire improved chapter participation at the PEC due to her communication efforts as conference liaison to the 165+ members attending the conference.

Tracey Smith chaired the Task Force Committee to combine the chapter's fundraising efforts. Her efforts in solicitation of paper and printing for TKCB resulted in tremendous savings.

New members and visitors were welcomed each month by volunteers of the Buddy Program, chaired by Kathi Thompson. Kathi was also active in planning the European Council visit.

Bobby Bulger visited Italy to recruit members of our sister "Gemelli" chapter to attend our October seminar.

Deborah Wheeler, CMP, chaired the Paralympics Volunteer effort for our chapter, resulting in Susie Carr, CMP, participating in the Paralympics in Atlanta as a volunteer planner.

All four of our International nominees, Lesley Meyer, CMP, Colleen Rickenbacher, CMP, Sally Goldesberry, CMP, and Joe Diaz are finalists for their respective awards to be announced in July in Nashville!



It's a Consensus—Outgoing President Phyllis Firebaugh Gracious Leader, Committed to Others

Ask what people whisper about her, and Phyllis Firebaugh, CMP, just shrugs her shoulders and laughs.

"I'm the last person to hear any gossip, so I don't know what people really think about me," said Firebaugh, who will complete her term as president of the D/FW MPI chapter this month.

"What I want people to see is some value in my intelligence, commitment and hard work. I hope they can see that," she said.

And what do people *really* think? Apparently, her colleagues have been paying attention.

"She is the consummate gracious lady," said Lesley Meyer, CMP, of Sunbelt Motivation & Travel, Inc. "She truly is the most gracious lady I have ever met."

Linda Sergeant, of Bill Reed Decorations, Inc., agrees. "Phyllis' nickname on MPINet is 'Fearless,' and she is," said Sergeant, who served on the Board of Directors this past year as vice president of administration. "She just does not lose her cool when things fall apart. She keeps her head and is always gracious."

Greg Pynes, of the Town of Addison, the chapter's vice president of education, echoes a familiar perspective. "Phyllis has a tremendous sense of grace," he said. "Her soothing and calming mannerisms—her poise—can bring you right back to focus and center."

Firebaugh shouldn't be surprised by the responses of her peers. Many consider her courageous. After all, she became president of the most celebrated chapter in the most visible association in the meetings industry in the same year Dallas was to host the MPI Professional Education Conference (PEC).

Her first order of business was establishing a theme and call to action—"A Commitment to Excellence: Exceeding Expectations!"

She then set some lofty goals, involving the upcoming PEC, and educational and membership opportunities within the D/FW Chapter.

And how did the chapter fare?

"When (MPI International President) David Kliman (CMP) said that the Dallas Chapter had brought the PEC to a whole new level, I knew we had reached our goal," said Firebaugh. "Cooperation and teamwork made it happen."

Firebaugh also noted the successes of the chapter's educational programs. She is particularly proud that every chapter member who participated in the CMP Workshop passed the CMP exam.

The membership committee "really exceeded my expectations," Firebaugh said. The numbers say it all—the D/FW Chapter added 182 new members this year, bringing the total membership to 669.

During her presidential year Firebaugh experienced a new and unexpected challenge when her position was eliminated. She remembers her first reaction, one of uncertainty, which tested her heralded poise and confidence.

Ultimately, however, it was her relationships—especially within MPI—that made the difference.

"The experience underscored my ap-

preciation of the value of my vast network of friends. Their support and encouragement meant a lot to me," she said.

Firebaugh passes on the presidential gavel with this advice: "Remember your resources."

She is now regional sales director with SEI Incentives, Inc.

She will continue her MPI involvement in several areas. As immediate past president she will continue to hold a seat on the chapter board of directors and will chair the Committee of Past Presidents and the Education 2000 Task Force.

She looks forward to spending more time with daughters Terri and Nicole, and perhaps returning to teaching a Sunday School class of four-year-olds.

Pynes, incoming president-elect of the D/FW MPI Chapter, says, "Phyllis is one of those unique individuals in our industry who is totally committed to the development of others. She's extremely savvy in that regard. She senses what people want to do and helps them get there," he said.



Meeting Professionals Make Significant Economic Impact

How do meeting professionals impact our economy? Consider the MPI's December 1995 Professional Education Conference (PEC). The City of Dallas expected to receive more than \$4 million from this three-day event. The buying power of this "small" (1,600 participants) conference is more than

\$600 million.

Think about the number of meeting and conventions held annually in the United States—more than 800,000 corporate meetings, more than 206,000 association meeting and more than 11,000 conventions!

In Texas, 1,087 MPI members are planners; 48% are corporate, 25% work for associations, 16% represent various other entities, and 11% are independent. The average meeting professional's budget is \$409,588.

In Texas, 34% of meetings are held at local hotels and university campuses, 33% are held at convention centers, 17% at resorts, and 16% at conference centers.

Meeting professionals—planners and suppliers—make up the second largest employment group in the Dallas/Fort Worth metroplex.

Texas MPI professional conduct an average of four meetings per year. Texas planners collectively account for a total of \$ 1.7 million spent on meetings annually. A "whopping" 83% of MPI members use other MPI members in their day-to-day business.


Industry estimates average costs of more than \$5,000 in time away from the office for a company to send an executive to a one-day seminar.

Considering the old adage, "time is money," meeting professionals are responsible for providing a good return on that investment, increasing the executive's value to the company.

Challenges and responsibilities focus on planning, managing and implementing meetings. Travel and entertainment—the third largest controllable expense at meetings—demands good organization and planning.

With a significant increases in all areas of activity, the Job Bank—the chapter's clearinghouse through which jobseekers can be matched with prospective employers—has fulfilled its goal of mak-

ing the Job Bank a worthwhile source for both job seeker and prospective employer.

In 1995-96 the Job Bank experienced a 55% increase in total number of applicants; a 134% increase in the number of jobs listed, and a 66% increase in

number of applicants placed.

A Job Bank Consortium implemented with the HSMA and NACE Job Bank chairs enabled the Job Banks of all three organizations to pool job leads and provide each applicant more access to job opportunities within the industry. This provides benefits for jobseekers as well as prospective employers.

The new voice mail system worked out extremely well for both job applicants and prospective employers. The Job Bank had tremendous response from employ-

ers seeking qualified applicants for job openings, as well as experienced and talented applicants.

The Job Bank sponsored a program in the chapter's Brown Bag Lunch educational series. A panel of speakers representing various disciplines within the meetings industry—i.e. hotels, convention and visitors bureaus, association planners, etc—provided an overview of the variety of careers within the meetings industry.

The Job Bank also sponsored an Executive Workshop. "Outsourcing Your Way to Independence" focused on outsource resourcing for the hospitality industry in the evolving independent meeting planning area.

The Public Relations Committee and Job Bank worked together to develop an informational flyer on advertising in the classified ad section of the *CURRENT*, the chapter newsletter.

Each time resumes are requested from the Job Bank, this flyer is sent to the prospective employer which allows them to solicit more resumes for their job opening as well as receiving the resumes from the Job Bank.

month with comments about "directed passion" as he explored the theme, "Charting New Directions—a Team Approach."

Clint Maun, CSP, nationally recognized speaker and consultant, provided food for thought—often with a terrific wit!—about enouraging others to be involved in team efforts.

"Good leaders encourage 50/ 50 involvements," he said. "It's not how good you are; it's how good you can inspire others to be."

In the workshops for newsletter editors, we discussed the ongoing outreach for new writers and contributors.

It's a challenge to encourage members who have valuable information or insights to share—but are not comfortable with their writing skills—to give it their best shot.

"But I'm not a good writer!" is the recurring refrain.
You don't have to be a terrific writer to submit
articles to the CURRENT!

We all come to MPI with different talents and abilities. Your editor lacks the experience and skills to organize a big convention or special event, or manage a CVB, or sell audiovisual services, or direct sales at a hotel, restaurant, speakers' bureau or . . .the list goes on!

Many who moan, "I can't write!" sell themselves short. But if you really are "sentence-and-paragraph-challenged"—one of the "writing-impaired" people—let's strike a deal.

You provide a story—"raw copy" about your committee project or event, or perhaps an insight regarding an issue in the meetings industry, or a brief treatise on your particular area—whatever you do and like best . . . and let me to do what I do best.

I'll peruse your copy, revise and edit it to fit the "quick read" newsletter format. Mine is a "write tight" approach. I'll pore over your words—hone 'em down, polish 'em up—and make you look good!

When seeking volunteers, Maun advises asking this question: "What do you want to get out of this project?"

"The best way to get mileage from any organization is to get others to know you," says Della Menechella, editor of the New Jersey Chapter newsletter. "A great way to gain exposure in this chapter is to contribute articles to the newsletter."

That's one good reason. Another: a bylined article fulfills at least one requirement toward the Certified Meeting Professional credential!

So, come on, all you hesitant would-be writers. Let's "direct passion" toward a "team approach."


