

February Meeting Highlights

American Airlines Sponsors Session on Ethics

"Ethics: Professionally Incorrect" was the theme of the February MPI D/FW chapter meeting at Plano Centre. Sponsored by American Airlines, the program featured William Brown, Ph.D, a clinical psychologist and president of The Ethics Institute in Washington, D.C.

Brown is the author of "The Right Thing: ethics inaction/ethics in action" (rev. 1995). He and his spouse, Nett, frequently speak to and consult with corporations and associations on ethical issues.



MPI D/FW chapter members **Sherry Cook, CMP** (Sherry Cook & Associates) and **Sandi Galloway** (Canadian Tourism Commission) served as "ethics panelists" in the program presented by **William Brown, PhD**. Assisting Brown is his wife, **Nett Brown**. Galloway, who recently served on MPI International's Professional Conduct Task Force, unveiled the MPI D/FW Ethics Wall at the February meeting (see front page).

Ethical Yardstick

Applying the following six steps to an issue prior to making a decision should increase the odds that a given decision will be ethical, i.e., culminating in doing the right thing.

- 1. Does your chosen course of action seem logical and reasonable? Forget what others might say. Does it make sense to you? If so, it is probably right.
- 2. Does the solution you choose pass the test of sportsmanship? If everyone followed this course of action, would the results be beneficial for all?
- 3. Where do you think your plan of action will lead? What effect will it have on others? What effect will it have on you?
- 4. How well will you think of yourself when you look back at what you have done?
- 5. Separate yourself from the problem. Imagine it is a problem affecting the person you most admire. How would that person respond to this problem?
- 6. What difference would it make if everyone knew about your decision? Especially consider how you would feel if your family members and friends knew what you have done or plan to do. Chances are decisions made in hope that no one will find out are not ethical.


