President's Message

Chapter Nominations: Practical or Political?

My April column included the text of a letter from a member expressing discontent at MPI D/FW's nominations and election process—and my invitation for others to respond with their thoughts and ideas on this important topic.

A response from Tracey Smith, a member of the 1998 Nominating Committee, explains in detail the MPI D/FW nominations and elections process.

The chapter follows a procedure outlined in the chapter Bylaws and Policies and Procedures. This process calls for:

- Creation of Nominations Committee based on planner and supplier mix
 - 2. Call for Nominations, allowing all members to participate
- 3. Creation of a slate of officers and ballot of Board of Directors
- 4. Presentation of slate and ballot to membership with call for additional nominations facilitated by use of a petition
 - 5. Mailing of slate and ballot for voting by membership
- 6. Collection and tallying of the vote
- 7. Installation of the Board

Here are *my* thoughts about how we nominate and elect chapter members to the Board and why I think it serves the organization well.

The outlined procedures allows the entire membership to participate in the nominating, the petitioning, and voting process. The MPI D/FW process does mirror the principles of a democratic society in that we nominate (primary process), we petition and we elect.

Many members I spoke to questioned the Nominating Committee. How is that a few members can sift through the nomination forms and come up with a slate of officers that are uncontested, and a ballot of a few options for the board positions?

How can that be democratic? My observation is that the nominating committee is similar to state conventions or the electoral college. Lest we forget, the voters do not elect the president of the United States. The "winner" is the candidate who receives a majority of the electoral votes, not the popular votes. The chapter's process follows the tenets of the democratic experience, providing members with input and participation.

The MPI D/FW Board has a long history of being a working body. Service on the board requires commitment and sacrifice. The chapter's nomination process is a practical approach with a focus on choosing the most qualified candidate willing to serve.

Gregory Pynes and Mary Lynn Novelli, CMP, Named Planner, Supplier of the Year at Last Year's Awards Gala

Gregory Pynes

MPI D/FW Chapter President Gregory Pynes, 1997 Planner of the Year, got into the meetings professions by chance.

As a 22-year-old graduate student completing work on a master of public administration degree, he was hired as administrative assistant to the city manager of the Town of Addison.

Drainage, public swimming pool construction, planning and zoning and "thrilling projects like the outsourcing of street cleaning were among my first projects," Pynes recalls with a wry smile.

The production of several special events and the construction of a conference and theatre centre was the beginning of Pynes' move into the meetings industry. He spent the next eight years working on both the planner and supplier side of the business.

In 1996 Pynes partnered with long time friend Rodney Hand to create Hand and Associates Marketing Communications, a company engaged in event production, publishing, and advertising.

A member of MPI D/FW since 1990, Pynes stresses personal outreach in attracting people to MPI. He was introduced to the organization by Betty Garrett, CMP, a long-time family friend.

Later, Paige Braun enlisted his service on the Governmental Affairs Committee. Pynes began his service on the MPI D/FW Board of Directors in 1993 and served as vice president of education before service as president-elect.

Education is one of Pynes' favorite areas. He taught for two years as an adjunct instructor in the Travel and Tourism Program at Richland College.

He was especially pleased when the MPI D/FW Chapter was the recipient of the coveted Award of Excellence for Education. The award was presented at the

1997 Professional Education Conference, the same year MPI D/FW was named Chapter of the Year for an unprecedented fourth time.

Pynes, whose presidential motivator motto is *Involvement through Service*, practices what he preaches. He recently joined other MPI members to charter an International Special Events Society Chapter for Dallas and now serves on that organization's board of directors.

Gregory Pynes was named MPI D/FW Chapter Planner of the Year and Mary Lynn Novelli, CMP, was named Supplier of the Year the night President Novelli handed over the gavel to President-Elect Pynes. The two—close friends both inside and outside the meetings industry—will name their successors at the June Awards Gala 1998.

A chapter member since 1989, Novelli became involved in 1991 when she accepted the regional director of sales position for Sterling Hotels & Resorts where she represents a "superior and diverse collection of deluxe hotels around the world," she says.

"I thought being involved in MPI would be the quickest and best way to get to know everyone in Dallas and Fort Worth" she says. "MPI has allowed me to make great planner contacts and, more importantly, it has allowed me to make great friends."

"Winning Supplier of the Year was a big deal to me," says Novelli, who served as 1996-97 MPI D/FW Chapter president. She expresses gratitude to Sterling

Hotels & Resorts "for their support in my MPI efforts."

"I have accepted the additional workload wholeheartedly because I believe that the personal and professional growth and accomplishments that can be achieved through involvement in MPI is priceless," Novelli said.

She is especially pleased with the continued growth of The MPI Kids Charity Ball. Novelli served as chair of the first of these balls which raise funds for a number of local children's charities.

But if you want to see Mary Lynn really smile, just ask her about the "love of her life"—her 4 ½ year old grandson, Dominic.


The reason she's not around the D/FW area much on weekends is because she is usually driving to Austin to spend quality time with Dominic and her daughter, Toni.





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

RECAP: The best writing is the simplest. Vigorous writing is concise. Strip every sentence to its cleanest components. Omit needless words and meaningless jargon. Less is more.

Simple "Write Tight" tips can help avoid verbal clutter.

One way to keep copy tight: avoid stringing two or three nouns together where one will do.

William Zinsserism, a renowned writer on writing, calls it "creeping nounism."

No one goes broke. We are experiencing money problem areas.

It no longer rains. We are experiencing precipitation activity.

We're not in a recession. We're experiencing a period of advanced negative economic growth.

Newsweek columnist George Will calls it "ersatz profundity," or, onamotaepoeically, "blatherspiel."

Choose one short, specific noun and avoid the extra verbiage.

Would we remember the great American statesman and founding father Benjamin Franklin—with such warmth if he had said, "In this world nothing is certain but negative patient-care outcome and revenue enhancement."

What if the great Russian writer Leo Tolstoy had penned a book titled Violence Processing and a State of Permanent Pre-Hostility?

Several examples of "creeping nounisms" and simpler expressions (some, tongue in cheek! ©):

- •curb the outflow of dollars (cut costs)
- ethically challenged (crooked)
- •chronologically gifted (old)
- •fiscally retentive (cheap)
- •adverse weather visibility device (windshield wiper)
- period of advanced negative economic growth (recession)





Participants in 5th Annual Meetings Industry Legislative Action Day Visit U.S. Congressmen to Discuss Industry Issues

This spring, several members of the MPID/FW participated in The 1998 Meetings Industry Legislative Action Day

to ear in first ti

(MILAD) in Washington, DC as part of a delegation of more than 250 meeting and convention industry representatives from eleven associations.

Seventy-two official MILAD teams conducted visits with

elected officials—to discuss key issues, including support for the United States National Tourism Organization

(USNTO), preservation of the 50% Business Meal Deductibility, and continued support of the Fairness in Music Licensing Act of 1997

Each team member took a particular issue and explained its affect on his particular business.

For example, a local hotel rep studied the Fairness in Music Licensing Act and described some of the unfair collection practices by some of the licensing organizations. Describing how the client, the property, and all associated vendors can be held liable strengthened our position.

The issue I discussed with legislators was the preservation of the 50% Meal Deductibility. As a small business owner, I explained, I cannot afford expensive

advertising. The best way for me to reach my potential clients is by entertaining them over a meal.

My perspective helped de-bunk the myth of the "three martini lunch" abuse of business entertainment.

There is one piece of pending legislation in the House (House Resolution 628) that seeks to restore the meal deductibility to 100%, so I asked Congressmen for their support of this proposed bill.

As proof that "grass-roots" politicking is effective, I received an e-mail from one the offices I visited with the news that Congressman Ron Paul (R-14th) from Houston had signed on to be a co-sponsor of HR 628 based on the information I had shared at our meeting.

On a very personal level, I am helping to shape legislation that benefits our industry!

To all MPI D/FW Chapter members who took the time to travel to D.C., I say thank you. What we're doing does make a difference!

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



