The evening focused on the amazing accomplishments throughout our 30-year history. The Metroplex Chapter (as it was called then) was first chartered on June 22, 1977 with just four members. From those most humble of beginnings to present day, MPI D/FW has been acclaimed for its outstanding leadership and industry contributions. By any measure of individual and organizational success you want to apply - awards, recognitions, assistance, collaboration, care, funding or endorsement - the MPI D/FW Chapter has been at the forefront from the very beginning.





Capacity Crowd "Navigates the Danger Zone"

The May meeting's morning workshop, "Navigating the Danger Zone: Charting the Murky Waters of Business Ethics," featured Paul Genender, a partner at Dallas-based Hughes & Luce, LLP, leading a capacity crowd in a lively discussion of ethical business practices. The session was not designed to answer every ethical consideration, but to begin a conversation within the meeting and event industry in which harmful business practices are identified and options suggested. Given the early morning attendance and positive evaluation responses, the workshop sponsors, Dallas/Fort Worth Independent Meeting Professionals (DFW-IMP) consortium, were pleased with the results. "Our goal by initiating this topic, was to begin a dialogue where harmful common business practices were publicly identified so they could no longer be ignored," said Dara Hall, CMP, CMM, DFW-IMP workshop chairperson. "Our hope is that an industry educated by healthy debate is more likely to treat each other with respect and engage in healthy competition."

Genender, a trial lawyer who represents and counsels clients on business matters involving antitrust, breach of contract (including covenants not to compete), business fraud, breach of fiduciary duty, deceptive trade practice, unfair competition, securities fraud, misappropriation and theft of trade secrets, and temporary and permanent injunctive relief, was chosen to facilitate the session not only for his experience but also his accessibility to planners and suppliers in the North Texas area. In his opening remarks, Genender clarified the point that the terms "business" and "ethics" are not contradictory. It is possible, Genender said, to be extremely ethical and still be a tough business person. Even in today's business climate where lengthy contracts are standard fare, it is not possible to construct clauses for every consideration. Therefore, business dealings require a leap of faith and the ability to trust one another.

Ethics is in the business spotlight even more today because of Enron. The resulting legislation, Sarbannes-Oxley, that mandates transparency in business transactions is the result of one bad apple acting unethically. As a consequence, employers are now citing unethical behavior as grounds for termination. Genender warned that mentors should be chosen wisely and specifically.


When confronted with a questionable ethics consideration, a series of tests can point to the most ethical course of action. Imagining what the person you most admire would do in the given situation or answering the question of whether you could tell your mother what you had done are two good indicators as to whether you are following an ethical path. When ethics are in question, it is better to ask for permission rather than forgiveness.

Thus armed, each table was presented with actual industry scenarios to review and weigh in on whether the ethical line was crossed. Scenarios included among others:

- * Is it ethical to take one company's proposal and have another produce it?
- * Can you transfer industry benefits and gifts to friends and family?
- * Who "owns" frequency points the client or the planner?
- * Can you cut out the middleman and hire his staff directly?

Chapter Multicultural Programs? by M.T. Hickman, CMP, CTP, Richland College

Over the last few years, the multicultural committee has provided members of MPI D/FW with luncheon presentations and seminars designed to help increase

awareness of multicultural issues and ways to conduct business in our multifaceted community. Have we done enough?

I can remind you of the statics the Dallas Morning News reported in August, 2005 that showed that Texas is a minority majority state, or quote the May, 2007 MSNBC article that noted that the minority population in the United Stated tops 100 million and that, according to the last census report, Hispanics are the largest and fastest growing population. But these are just numbers. The reality of these figures plays out in our lives every day.

When I call to pick up my voice messages, I have the option to listen to the prompts in Spanish or English. In parts of the city I can find business signs that are only in Chinese or Korean, making me feel like I am in another country. When was the last time you walked down the greeting card aisle at the grocery store? You can now find greeting cards that cater to different cultures. If you want to wish someone a happy Bat Mitzvah or Quinceanera, the cards are there. If you want to reach out to an African American friend, you may select from Hallmarks' "Mahogany" line, cards that have been designed exclusively by and for African Americans since 1987.



The course will cover risk assessments, designing security plans, selecting proper security services providers, and developing emergency management plans. As a final project for the class, students will create their own Crisis Management Plan.

Class will include on-line work as well as classroom time. Class meetings are Friday September 7, 6:00 - 10 p.m., Saturday, September 8, 8:30 a.m. - 5:30 p.m., Sunday, September 9, 1:00 - 5:00 p.m., Friday September 21, 6:00 - 10 p.m., Saturday, September 22, 8:30 a.m. - 5:30 p.m., and Sunday, September 23, 1:00 - 5:00 p.m.

TRVM 2301 Introduction to Convention/Meeting Management This is an introductory course that covers the ABC's of meeting planning. This is a great course for anyone wanting to get into the business or needs to learn the vocabulary. The course covers types of meetings, meeting markets, industry suppliers, budget and program planning, site selection and contract negotiations, registration and housing, food and beverage requirements, functions and meeting room setup, and audiovisual requirements.. Class is offered as a morning class and evening class.

Class meetings are Thursday nights 7:05 - 9:50 p.m. August 30 - December 13. Day class 8:00 - 9:20 a.m. on Tuesday and Thursday, August 28 - December 11.The instructors are Chuck Laterza CMP, evening class and M.T. Hickman CMP, CTP, day class.

TRVM 2331 Convention and Exposition Law and Ethics This course examines general legal principles and statutory requirements for meetings, conventions and trade shows. The emphasis is on the ethical considerations of problems faced by meeting planners, hotels, and convention centers in the negotiation and implementation of agreements for meetings and similar events. In addition this course will cover legal issues for travel and suppliers.

TRVM 1201 Customer Sales and Service is a short 32 hour class that helps both new employees and seasoned professionals deal with customer service issues. Students will gain practical information and techniques used to create excellent customer service and service unique to the travel public. Topics include cultural differences as they apply to customer service, business etiquette and how build relationships with customers.

TRVM 1331 Introduction to the Hospitality Industry is an introductory course that focuses on hotel terminology and operations. In addition, this course includes transportation, lodging, hospitality, cruises, group tours, parks, convention centers, governmental agencies and associations.
